

English Language Diagnostic Test Guide

The English Diagnostic Test checks grammar, vocabulary, and basic understanding of everyday English.

1. Grammar Topics included:

- Present Simple – for routines and facts (*e.g., I study English at school.*)
- Past Simple – for finished actions (*e.g., We visited our grandparents last weekend.*)
- Present Continuous – for actions happening now (*e.g., She is doing her homework now.*)
- Future (will) – for predictions (*e.g., I think the test will be easy.*)
- Comparatives and superlatives – to compare things (*e.g., Maths is harder than English.*)
- Countable and uncountable nouns – much, many, a few (*e.g., There isn't much time.*)
- Modal verbs – can, must, should, have to (*e.g., Students must arrive on time.*)
- Question forms – word order in questions (*e.g., Why are you late?*)
- Conditionals (basic) – If + present, will (*e.g., If I pass the test, I will be happy.*)

2. Vocabulary Topics in the Test

- Daily life – *hobbies, school subjects, free time*
- People and jobs – *teacher, manager, designer, student*
- Places – *city areas, buildings, transport*
- Weather – *cold, windy, rainy, sunny*
- Health – *feeling sick, visiting a doctor, medicine*
- Technology – *phones, computers, internet*
- Feelings – *happy, nervous, tired, excited*

3. What the Test Does NOT Require

You do NOT need to write essays, speak, or translate long texts. The test is multiple-choice. It checks understanding, not memorization of rules.
